

HAT DO THE REMAKE OF PATRICK,
WWII miniseries The Pacific,
AFL's The Footy Show and
Justin Bieber all have in
common? If you answered
"Horror!" you'd be right, but also wrong.
Instead, they have all called Melbourne's
Docklands Studios home, even if, in
Bieber's case, only for a night.

Next month, the Victorian studio destination turns 10. In the decade since the results of a film industry thinktank chaired by Sigrid Thornton recommended the Victorian State Government build such a venture to capitalise on the international production activity and the strong crew and personnel base in Melbourne, films as diverse as Spike Jonze's Where The Wild Things Are and Nic Cage flamer Ghostrider have shot there, as has a stack of Australian film and television. In the case of The Pacific, they even managed to make Melbourne look like a South Seas paradise.

Docklands Studios CEO Rod Allen (a former TV and film producer with Southern Star, his final credit was the splendid true crime mini-series *Blue Murder*), says that the decision has paid Outside Dockfands, which consists of five TV and film studies.

off in spades: "The direct production investment, over the productions that have shot here, has injected over half a billion dollars into the Victorian economy over the decade."

And the weirdest request put to the studio from a production? Perhaps unsurprisingly, *The Footy Show.* "The producers asked if they could have a footballer kick a ball over one of our buildings," says Allen. "Or Sam Newman crushing a car with a monster truck."
